

2025 Projects Report farm by Jim Hanson

Our projects committee has seen a more normal flow of applications after a break-out year in 2024, with one exception. Private, earmarked donations have pushed the total amount going to the **Mamaka Agricultural Project** to over \$118,000 for 2025. They are currently working with 216 farmers and adding new projects along the way, including inland fisheries and bee-keeping.



With the help of a grant from the Northern California RPCV group last year, the Mamaka Project bought 75 hives. At present 30 hives are colonized with a first harvest in April of this year. (The picture above shows one of the women farmers presenting the US Ambassador with a quart of honey from the first harvest.) Based on the initial harvest volumes, and

anticipating two harvests per year, a farmer can make \$80/hive/yr.

The Mamaka Project placed the hives in our demonstration cashew plantation. The bees pollinate the trees. The plantation is now 3 years old, and the picture with the two boys shows a sample of the first harvest. Cashew trees reach full yield capacity in 5-7 years and will continue to produce for about 25 years.

Two health clinics in the Freetown area received grants this year. The **Comforti Women's and Children's Clinic**, in Calaba



Town, received \$2000 to purchase steel doors and windows for their new clinic. SUDU Salone, an NGO that works to find homes for orphaned and displaced children, took on the rehabilitation of the Murray Town Health Clinic. A \$4000 FoSL grant enabled them to purchase new maternity and hospital bed for the facility. Another well-known NGO in Sierra Leone. Uman Talk, was granted \$4000 to provide sanitary supplies and sex and health education at three junior secondary schools in Waterloo.

The Lokomasama Secondary School in Port Loko was able to upgrade their biology, chemistry, and physics labs with a \$3750 grant from FoSL. This will greatly enhance their STEM education program, and better prepare students for their final exams. In Bo, the Craftshare Technical Institute received \$1900 to rehabilitate the school's latrines, which serve 200 to 300 students per year.


A small community in Kambia District, Bapuya Village, was overjoyed to hear that they would receive \$3750 to complete their community centre. This begun with projects was in 2023 community contributions. They came to FoSL, as no one else was willing to help this small community complete their center. They are working hard to complete it before the rainy season arrives.



With the start of the new school year in August, FoSL once again donated \$250 from the Daphne Sawyer Dunn Scholarship fund to The **Paul School for the Blind** in Bo. This fund aids needy sight-impaired students with everything from uniforms to transportation.

The Friends of Sierra Leone has joined in a new partnership this year, begun by RPCVs Brenda and Bruce Blair. The **Passion for Learning Initiative** will work to increase childhood literacy in Mondema, a village in the Kenema District. They are working to remodel a donated building for after-school programs, and hope to hire a literacy teacher to work with all the primary schools in the area. We are not quite done with 2025 yet. Our committee will be reviewing six new applications this month for possible funding. The projects committee would like to thank all of you for your loyal support. You make all this work possible! Happy Holidays.

To ensure this important work is fully supported, the Fundraising Committee is launching several new initiatives aimed at expanding our donor base, reenergizing member participation, and building long-term sustainability for FoSL.
